Virtual conservatoire's StAMP of success

The University of St. Andrews will continue its StAMP Virtual Conservatoire programme on 20 March, from 2.00pm - 4.00pm, with a multifaceted session delivered by its renowned team of tutors, which includes the University's Ensemble-in-Residence - The Wallace Collection and special guests, Russell Gray, Tracey Redfern and Andrew Knight-Hill. The session is co-promoted with the Royal Irish Academy of Music and New Music Dublin, and is one of their launch events for the new initiative to support composers and brass players across the island of Ireland.

Participants of any age and ability are welcome to join the Virtual Conservatoire, no matter where they are from. The whole experience lasts just two hours and participants are can join the parts that they are most interested in, or suited to. The session commences with a short yoga breathing session delivered by practitioner Shams Abu-Tayeh and jazz pianist, Richard Michael, who will teach everyone a tune to play by ear.

Music for playalong sessions will be drawn from the Cyfarthfa Band repertory, the 19th Century Welsh band whose music was rediscovered in the 1980s by musicologist, Trevor Herbert, plus The Wallace Collection, but remains relatively unknown. Stuart Harris-Logan, from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, will share what he does as the archivist for one of the most significant brass instrument collections in the UK, as well as some of the other historical manuscripts and gems from deep within the Conservatoire's archives. These historical insights will be complemented by a focus on contemporary playing techniques: members of The Wallace Collection will share some of the more 'adventurous' ways of playing brass instruments that are beyond traditional extended techniques, but in some cases some 200 years old. Joining the ensemble in this exploration of sonic possibilities will be Andrew Knight-Hill from the University of Greenwich, who will live in real-time use freely available, low-latency audio networking for electronic processing (again using freely-available software) of Wallace Collection players. John Wallace CBE will also share his thoughts about how socially-distanced and online music-making are a sonic adventure that we can all learn to enjoy.

A new feature of the Virtual Conservatoire will be the 'Ask Me Anything' session with Russell Gray and Tracey Redfern. Between them, Russell and Tracey have vast experience in brass bands and orchestral brass, so participants can ask questions about anything - conducting, teaching, adjudicating, as well as









playing historical music, new music and everything in-between.



There's a 'Soloist Spotlight,' featuring Daniel Thomas, Siobhan Bates, Brett Baker and Richard Marshall, at 3.15pm and delegates can 'Meet the Legends' at 4.00pm.
